



|-----------------------|--------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------------|
| Perspective           | The art of representing three-dimensional objects on a two-dimensional surface.                                                      |
| Figurative drawing    | Figurative drawing, also called life drawing, focuses on capturing the human form.                                                   |
| Shape                 | Shapes are two-dimensional. Geometric shapes are perfect and regular. Organic shapes are irregular and natural.                      |
| Composition           | The arrangement of different elements within an artwork or design.                                                                   |
| Complementary colours | Two colours opposite each other on the colour wheel. Combined, they will provide a high contrast and high impact colour combination. |


