Judaism - Jewish religious belief is that there is one eternal God who is a spirit and has no human form.

Star of David - key symbol of Judaism represented by a six pointed star

Hanukhah –Jewish festival commemorating the rededication of the Second Temple in Jerusalem at the time of the Maccabean Revolt against the Seleucid Empire. It is also known as the Festival of Lights. Celebrated with a nightly menorah lighting, special prayers and fried foods.

Sukkhot - is a weeklong Jewish holiday celebrates the gathering of the harvest

Sabbath (Shabbat)- Jewish holy day from nightfall Friday to nightfall Saturday.

Yom Kippur - also known as the Day of Atonement, is the holiest day of the year in Judaism. Its central themes are atonement and repentance. Jewish people traditionally observe this holy day with an approximate 25 hour period of fasting and intensive prayer, often spending most of the day in synagogue services

Synagogue – a building in which Jewish people worship and study their religion Judaism. Teachers of the Jewish faith are called **rabbis**. They lead worship in the synagogue, conduct marriage and funeral ceremonies and give people advice on religious matters.

Kiddush prayer	blessing recited over wine or grape juice to sanctify the Shabbat and Jewish holidays.
Sukkah	tent-like structures made during Sukkhot they represent the huts in which the Israelites lived in during their 40 years of wandering in the desert after escaping from slavery in Egypt.
Kosher	"clean" or "pure," refers to food that has been ritually prepared or blessed so it can be eaten by religious Jew

Knowledge Mat Jewish artefacts

Torah	The Torah scroll contains the laws by which Jews try to live. Sections of the Sefer Torah (the first 5 books of the Bible) are read during the Shabbat service.
	A small case made from wood, metal, pottery or plastic used to remember God. Nailed to the upper right of the door. Jews touch it as they pass then kiss their fingers. It is a reminder of God's presence and that the people living in the home follow his law.
Yad	A pointer, often made of silver, used when reading from the Torah because it is too precious to be touched by hand.
Skull cap - Kippah	Worn as a witness of Jewish faith, to show respect, as a reminder that there is always something separating us from God & that God is 'looking down'. Orthodox Jews always wear one, others only for prayers.
Menorah	7 branched candlestick lit daily in the Temple. At Hanukkah a 9 branched candlestick (Hanukkah) celebrates the temple re-dedication
Tallit	Prayer shawl. Blessings are said before the put the shawl round the shoulders, giving a feeling of shelter and belief that God is all around.
Kiddush cup	Cup used to hold the wine for the saying of the Kiddush prayers at Shabbat & Pesach.
Challah	Bread used on Sabbath table

Shabbat is the weekly period of rest from Friday evening until Saturday night. This is not strictly a religious festival but a Jewish practice. The word Shabbat means rest, and remembers when God created the world in six days ad rested on the seventh.










Moses

Moses was an important Jewish prophet thought to have saved the Jewish slaves in Egypt


