Christianity

In the News Testament Christians are told to practice hospitality and serve others.

<u>Sikhism</u>

<u>Humanism</u>

Humanists believe that we must help each other and we are responsible for making the world a better place.

Langar

Guru Amar Das formalised the concept of Langar – the free kitchen – within the Sikh faith. This still continues today. Langar is also the name given to the free meal prepared and eaten at the Gurdwara. It is a central part of the Sikh faith.

Key questions to discuss at home:

- Why do we give, as well as receive?
- What can be given that does not have monitory value?
- What do other faiths teach about sharing with others?
- Should we share with everyone or just our own family?

Key Vocabulary:

charity - the voluntary giving of help, typically in the form of money, to those in need.

hospitality – looking after visitors or strangers

serve – perform duties or acts of service for a person or organisation

Langar – free food shared amongst people. Langar is practised in the Sikh faith.
